

Web Proxies in Schools

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To prevent students from accessing non-school-related content during classes, most K-12 schools implement some form of website blocking through network-level restrictions and forced extensions on student devices. However, some websites blocked by these restrictions may inhibit the development of student passions and even classroom content. To combat these internet access restrictions, organizations and individuals—such as Titanium Network—have invested countless hours into bypassing internet restrictions in schools. They employ technologies such as web proxies and DNS bypasses to achieve this goal, recruiting volunteer developers from all over the country to advance their technologies. As both bypass and censorship technology become stronger, evaluating the ethical considerations on both sides of the debate becomes necessary.

On one hand, proponents of strict blocking argue that students are less likely to be distracted by non-educational content during class. This allows for a more controlled classroom environment that ensures the students are focused on classroom activities the most. They believe bypassing institutional restrictions with web proxies undermines the authority and purpose of the school's policies. Further, reducing time spent by educators watching students for possible non-educational activities leads to better learning outcomes. By creating or using web proxies, individuals can access content that might be inappropriate or even detrimental in a school setting, which can lead to disciplinary actions or even legal consequences. It is the educational institution's responsibility to prevent such negative incidents.

On the other hand, the over-restriction of websites can hinder students' ability to explore their interests and utilize certain online resources that could help enhance their learning experience. By unintentionally blocking websites that offer valuable educational content, schools may unintentionally limit students' opportunities for personal and academic growth. Proponents of web proxy usage further argue that in cases where censorship is used to suppress critical viewpoints or control narratives, web proxies become a tool for ensuring that individuals can make informed decisions and think critically, free from institutional bias.

Discussion Questions
